Dear Friend,

In the last 14 years, we have seen God's hand in the ministry as we strive to enrich and empower the lives of the children in our care. Three years ago, we completed the construction of the Sister2Sister Children's Home and School, where we now accommodate 18 girls and seven babies and toddlers. Some of these girls are teen mothers who have endured much trauma.

> They live in the home with their babies, and we have made it possible for them to continue their education. We have some who are not moms but need a safe place to grow and thrive in a Christian environment where they learn the Gospel and live without fear of being forcefully married off by their families due to poverty.



The girls in grades 1st - 8th attend a local school where we pay tuition as well as provide all of their school supplies and uniforms. Education is not free in Kenya. The girls that are in high school all attend and live at a secondary school. Every

3 months they have a break and return to the children's home to reunite with their babies who we care for while they are away at school. We pay tuition for these girls as well and cover the cost of their uniforms, textbooks and any supplies they need for their studies.

In addition to caring for the babies, we teach the girls skills like sewing, baking, cooking, gardening, housekeeping, knitting and other life skills. These skills help prepare them for when they outgrow the children's home, so they can be self sufficient and find success in life.

The children's home makes every effort to be resourceful. We get our water from a bonehole (water well) that is operated by solar energy panels. We grow some of our food in our garden and we raise chickens for food and income.



The story of Esther is one example of a young girl who was forced into early marriage, but we managed to rescue her and her baby. She and the baby now live at the Sister2Sister Children's Home while she attends school, and her baby is cared for by the caretakers at the Children's Home.

We continue the feeding program that we started in January 2012 at the PCEA Muthini Primary School upon realizing that many children were sleeping under trees during lunch because they did not have food. The feeding program serves daily lunch to 200 children so they can thrive in and out of the classroom. Nutrition is a key component to a child's ability to focus and learn. Salem Presbytery continues to financially support the feeding program annually.

Our goal is to help as many girls as possible to realize their dreams by providing a safe place for them while they grow and learn. We strive to provide loving care centered on God and a sense of belonging at the Sister2Sister International Children's Home and School.
